Disability and domestic abuse risk assessment

This risk assessment has been developed by Stay Safe East from our work over the past 10 years with disabled survivors. It is not meant to replace the national DASH risk assessment but to be used alongside it. It is a tool to enable practitioners to identify the specific risks which arise from the power the abuser or abusers hold over a victim/survivors because she/he/they is a disabled person, and in most cases because of the specific nature of the relationship e.g. the abuser is also the 'carer', or claims to be a 'carer' to the disabled person. This does not mean the survivor is inherently vulnerable because they are a disabled person, but that they are in a situation where abuse, lack of power and control, and the barriers they face accessing help, put them at more risk.

Practitioners will also need to be aware of the particular forms of domestic abuse perpetrated against disabled survivors, and of the specific nature of targeted abuse and control. We have include some of these in the examples for the first two questions.

We usually only share this risk assessment with practitioners whom we have trained. However in the light of the COVID 19 crisis and the very high risks faced by disabled survivors, we have decided to share it with our partners.
